# PREPARE - INTENT

- Professional discussions to interpret baseline data.
- Teachers to identify gaps in learning to inform medium term planning.
- Teachers to identify targeted support, overlearning or pre-learning that will support closing the gap.
- Contact other schools in the MAT to support strategic planning and solutions to providing School-Led Tutoring.
- Check DfE allocations for school requirement for tutoring funding.
- Review cost for allocating TLR3 and timetabling for using teaching staff to deliver tutoring.
- Employ staff needed to deliver programs.
- Identify CPD required for staff.
- Identify research-based intervention programs to support pupils.

#### **DELIVER - IMPLEMENTATION**

- Funding provided for 210 hours at £47 per hour.
- April 2022 funding was increased to 255 hours for 17 pupils.
- Total cost of tutoring provision = £9870, £7,402 funded directly by the DfE. Updated cost of provision £11,985; £8.998.75 funded directly by the DfE.
- 14 pupils funded for 15 hours of tutoring each.
- Appointment of additional LP hours to cover 210 hour tutoring requirement.
- First pupils identified and included on Census data for October 2021.
- LP to complete DfE directed training in November before starting tutoring program.
- Clear targets set, by class teacher, to assess progress.
- Records of number of hours received by each identified child maintained by tutor.
- Update school census once a term with hours provided.
- September 2022 funding 420 hours at £47 per hour.
- Total cost of tutoring provision = £19,740, £11,844 (60%) funded directly by the DfE. £7,896 funding from Pupil Premium.
- 28 pupils funded for 15 hours of tutoring each.
- 4<sup>th</sup> and final year of funding
- September 2023 funding 225 hours at £47 per hour.
- Total cost of tutoring provision £10,575, £5,287.50 (50%) funded directly by the DfE. £5287,50 funding from Pupil Premium.

## SUSTAIN - IMPACT

- Records kept by Tutor of hours provided and feedback on progress to class teachers.
- Follow-up tutoring for 2022/23 (60%) and 2023/24 (50%, updated from 25% as previously listed) when further guidance received.
- Online form from the Education and Skills Funding Agency (ESFA) completed at the end of the year.
- Training was undertaken by an LP6 in school who undertook bespoke tutoring for 6 pupils.
- Tutoring undertaken for remaining 11 pupils by a qualified teacher employed 1 day a week. This to be continued in 2022-2023.
- Progress reported to class teachers. Pupils requiring support from September 2022 identified and sessions continue 1 day a week with a qualified teacher.
- Pupils baselined and identified for support from 1:1 tutor (qualified teacher) 1 day a week. Reports received for progress from previous year.
